### LANGUAGE

### INDUSTRIAL ARTS

All shops will have projects or display. Students working on projects during Open House, will show parents the work accomplished by them.

### HOMEMAKING

Displays, Rooms 23 and 24. Notebooks and sewing accomplishments of the students will be represented.

The WUHS district's new school, Irvington High, will not open until at least March of next year. The reason for the six month delay is the steel strike.

Irvington High was built for about 1200 students, but because it won't be open until six months later than expected, more rooms will be added so it can accommodate 1600. This makes it about the size of WUHS district's second school, James Logan.

Because Irvington might not open at all next year, and Washington will have to accommodate the Irvington students, next year's Freshmen and Sophomores from Newark will attend James Logan High.

Principal for Irvington is Mr. Clyde Voorhees.

### Judy Lee To Head Steering Committee

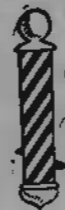
The steering committee for W.U.H.S. District's new school in Irvington has started its work.

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## Enrollment Way Up; Now Stands at 2176

Washington High School's enrollment has increased approximately one thousand per cent since it opened in 1952. When Washington first opened, the enrollment was 22; it is now 2176.

This increase may account for the changing from one room to our present building. It also explains why James Logan was built, and why high schools are to be built in Irvington and Newark.

Washington has 380 new students this year as compared to 274 students who dropped out. The trend seems to indicate that more Freshmen and new students enroll every year than Seniors graduate and student drop out.

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## Dress Down Day Precedes Dance

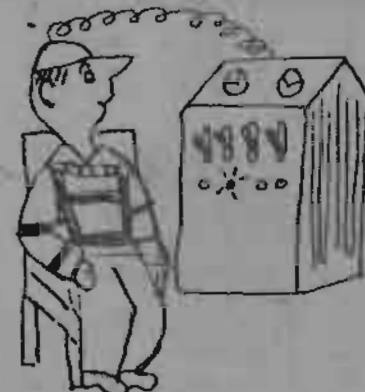
