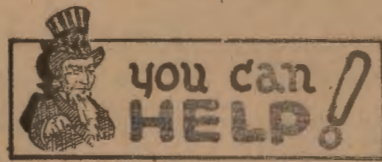

Blind Pianist to Present Assembly to Students Today

Seeing Eye Dog 'Ilsa' to Give Demonstration

Washington Union High School will be entertained today by a blind pianist, considered by many to equal Alec Templeton.

Miss Rose Resnick, who is the featured artist, has an education that would cause many people to turn green with envy. Miss Resnick is a graduate of Hunter's College, New York. Her musical ability brought her a scholarship for further study in France. She has but recently received her Master's Degree in music from the University of California.

The National Federation of Music Clubs awarded her first place in their annual contest.

Miss Resnick will demonstrate her "seeing eye" dog, Ilsa. After Miss Resnick presents a group of piano numbers, she will explain and demonstrate how Ilsa works and helps her.

Miss Resnick will be assisted in presenting this assembly by other blind persons who will demonstrate the Braille System of writing and reading between piano numbers. They will also explain how Braille books are made for the blind.

This concert program is sponsored by the National Transcribers' Society for the Blind at Palo Alto, California, an organization employing blind to make Braille books for other blind people to enjoy.

Stamp Sales Drop From \$125 to \$100

Stamp sales started with average sales of \$125 weekly at the beginning of the school year. They have now dropped to the \$100 weekly, and at times the average is a little below that figure.

From September, 1943, to the present, the total sales in bonds and stamps are \$23,775.90, which is very much higher than that of last year. However, the percentage of students purchasing stamps is very low. This week only 139 students bought stamps. 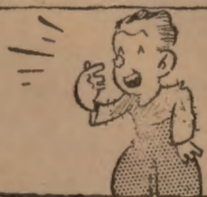
